


Class 4 – Morpurgo



What a busy start to the term Year 5 have had. We have been learning about the Anglo Saxons as part of our new topic. What bloodthirsty people they were! This has linked into our English as we have been learning how to structure and write a diary entry based around Beowulf. In science we have been using Newton metres as part of our scientific enquiry into forces. We certainly enjoyed exploring and working with the equipment. Finally, in maths we have been looking at place value upto 1,000,000, comparing numbers and rounding too. Year 6 have had a busy start to the year packed with their new topic of 'Crime and punishment through the ages' along with several visitors and visits. Last week, Cummins visited the school and ran a STEM morning for Year 6 so that they could experience some of the engineering roles that are carried out at Cummins. It was brilliant to see the children working together as teams to solve challenges and overcome barriers; some even braved standing on their own bridge constructions made of paper!

Later in the week, they visited a mosque in Leicester as part of their topic learning about Islam. The children learnt about the Five Pillars of Islam and they related them to their lives. We were shown around the different areas of the mosque and saw where the prayers took place and where the worshippers wash before they pray.

This week began with a visit from the magistrates court which explored how the court system works and the role in which magistrates hold within our community. We were able to explore where there are similarities and differences between the rather gory Anglo-Saxon approach to crime and punishment and how courts operate today. The children behaved beautifully and there were some impressive performances in the court case reenactment.

The magistrate showed us how the courts work. They showed us what people do in court by doing a court session about someone cyberbullying.
