Dear Parents and Carers,

Our value this term is **'Respect and Reverence'** and we strive in school to show how we all **'listen well, take turns and value the opinions of others'**. Many of our children in key stage 2 are shocked, worried and openly talking about their understanding of what is happening with Ukraine and Russia. As a school, we are being led by their questions and have sought guidance how to answer their questions in a child friendly way. We are talking about what it means to be a good neighbour and how we all have the right to be treated with respect. This week I have received letters from children who want to help and I will be working with our School Council to see how we can make a difference at Braunston.

As a school, we have decided to return to whole school or phase assemblies. We are all back together on the playgrounds during lunchtime, and are able to move more freely between classrooms. Much of our COVID risk assessments remain in place including sanitising, increased cleaning and staff wearing masks in communal areas. We are also going to continue to alert year groups to any COVID cases due to the vulnerabilities within our school community.

Next week, we say our goodbyes to Rev Nat who has been one of the school's greatest supporters and friend. The school has benefited so much from Rev Nat's guidance and developed much stronger links with the Church. The children at Braunston will miss Rev Nat's Collective Worship and the skilful way in which she presents key messages and ensuring that we all know that we are valued by God. Rev Nat moves onto a new parish who are very lucky to have her!

Please take time to read the diary dates as there is a lot going on in the run up to Easter. FOBS are running a Mother's Day present room and an Easter event – letters have been sent out with more details. The school is looking at improving our Key Stage 1 playground and we will be able to share our plans in the near future.

The children celebrated World Book Day yesterday and looked amazing. Books were read, shared and recommended and we continued to raise the profile of reading at Braunston. We believe every child is a reader and that reading is the gateway to accessing the full curriculum. Thank you for your support in this, not only in providing costumes for your child but also for listening to your child read as often as you are able to.

Next week, I will be sending out information regarding being a volunteer at Braunston. We are looking for support in listening to children read and in supporting swimming lessons. The pool is scheduled to be up and running so that we can have lessons in both summer terms. (Fingers crossed!).



Reception Class – Inkpen

This term we are learning all about dinosaurs! We have loved dressing up as a T-rex and Triceratops and sharing lots of dinosaur stories in our reading area. Our primary text is 'The Dinosaur that Pooped the Past!' We have been using junk modelling to create inventions for Danny and Dinosaur to travel back to the past to visit the dinosaurs. We are constantly improving with our writing and have been busy making information zigzag books about fossils and have written some captions for dinosaur pictures.

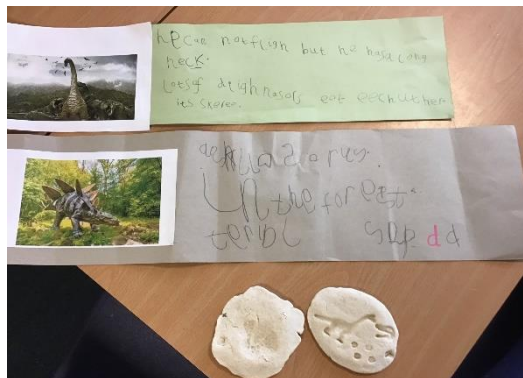

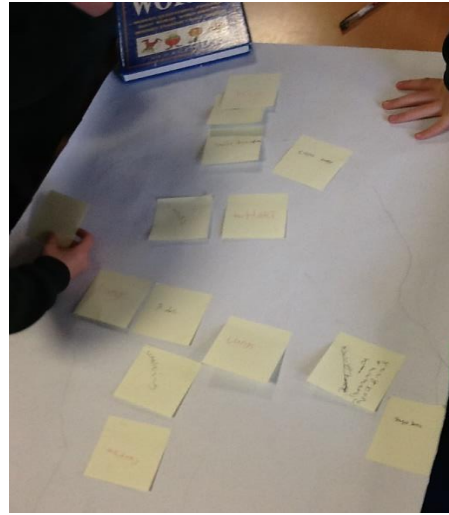


Class 3 - Jamila

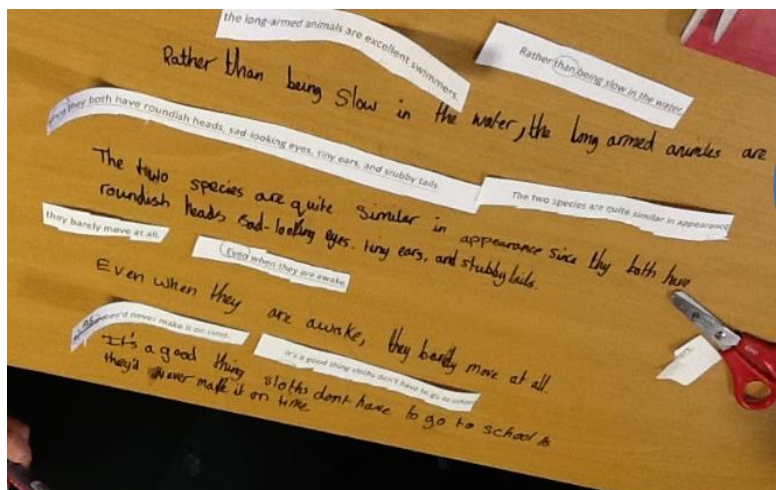
Class 5 – Rowling

Class 6 – Horowitz

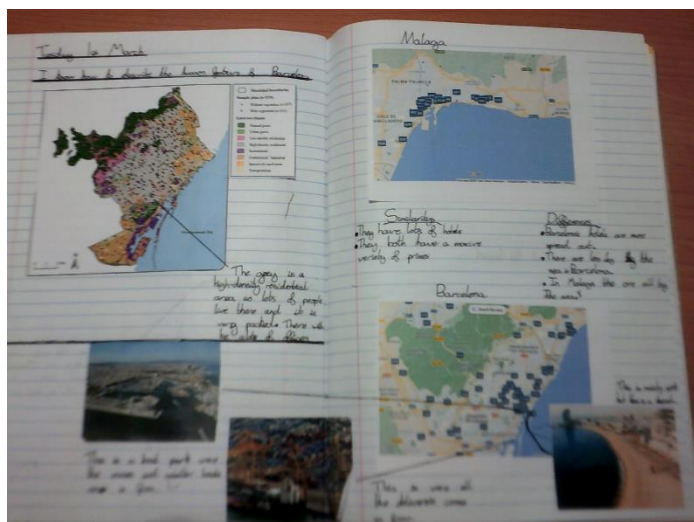
