Class 1 - Donaldson

It is almost the end of the first term in Donaldson class and the children have settled in beautifully. They are all trying their best with the Year 1 curriculum and have tackled any challenges they have faced. The children are clear on the routines and expectations in the classroom and on the playground and we are very proud of the Year 1 learners they have become.

In our science topic, we are learning about trees and looking at the seasons.

We have learnt about autumn, recorded the weather and looked at the changes that happen outside. We will compare all of the data we have collected about autumn when we discover what happens in winter, spring and summer.

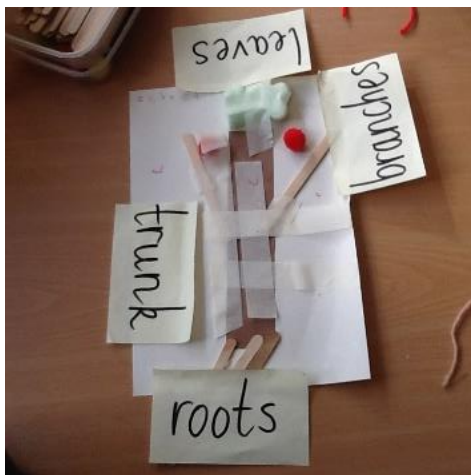
When learning about trees we searched the school grounds for leaves that had fallen. We then took them back to the classroom to identify and classify them. We learnt that some trees are evergreen, which means they are forever green, and some trees are deciduous, which means their leaves change colour and fall off in autumn. We learnt about the main parts of a plant and made our own trees which we labelled.

We discussed what clothes we might wear in the autumn and also what outside activities we might do. We decided going for an autumn walk to collect acorns and conkers was our favourite outdoor activity. We then agreed, going home to a warm house, hot chocolate and a biscuit would make the perfect autumn day.

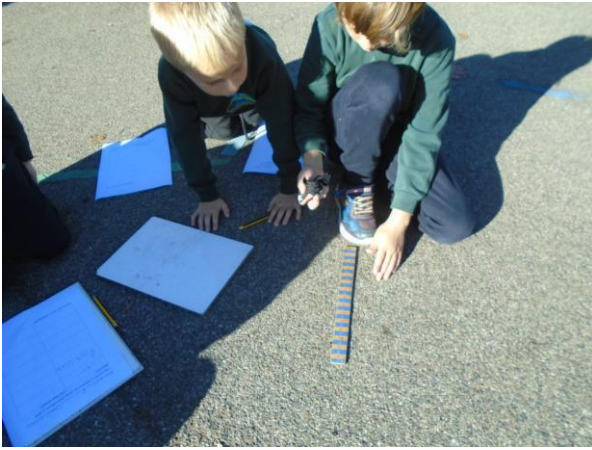
Class 2 – Ahlberg

In Ahlberg class we have transformed into mini scientists in the past 2 weeks - testing materials and suggesting ways to solve our scientific problems. The children have solved problems such as holes letting in rain in jousting tents, Henry VIII's spillages at feasts, a princess woken up by the light through her window and the problem with the castle archery team always getting ripped knees in their trousers!

They have learned and used specific scientific vocabulary such as absorbency, durability, flexibility and transparency. In art we have been studying Paul Klee and we are using his strong shapes and colour ideas to create our own works of art.

In English we have written an account of a castle siege using all the knowledge we learned in our history work and we have finished the 'Paper Bag Princess' story, which had a rather unexpected but brilliant ending! An utterly FANTASIC first term in Year 2 and I can't wait to see how the children continue to progress next term. Well done Ahlbergs!

Class 3 - Jamila

Year 3 have amazed us all with their efforts across all subjects. Everyone is trying to be really independent and look after their learning resources and keep the classroom tidy! In maths, we have been learning how to solve addition and subtraction problems using a number line. We are also using formal addition and subtraction methods which means we have to set out our work very neatly - one number per square.

Mr Webb, from Pacesetters has been teaching year 3 hockey and the children have developed skills building up to mini matches. In French, we have been learning how to say hello, goodbye and ask each other questions such as 'How are you?'. We sent a video to our partner school in France, Ecole Saint Marie in Chaumes en Retz, and hope that they are impressed with our French.

Mrs Phipps has been super impressed with the children's work on instructions, children can use imperative verbs accurately and have written very precise instructions.

Class 4 – Morpurgo

Another busy few weeks in year 4: we have started reading *The Lion, The Witch and The Wardrobe* and we are all entranced by the stories the characters. We have made human sentences of dialogue with people standing in the correct positions for their punctuation or words and have enjoyed drama to build up ideas. In maths, we have continued developing our place value knowledge and have moved on to applying this to addition.

We continued with our science unit on Sound and had fun investigating using the data loggers which measured the sound in decibels; we found that year 2 were the noisiest and year 6 the quietest. We hope we didn't disturb Braunston when we investigated what effect the distance of the sound source would have on the volume! We finished the unit, by exploring pitch through trying to make different instruments. We found out that different lengthen straws made different notes and elastic bands with different tightness did too. One of us even made a recorder!!

As well as all we do for the curriculum, we enjoyed eating brioche with jam on European Languages day after we had successfully asked for it in French! On this day, we found out about some of the diverse languages spoken in London. Can you believe over 250 are spoken which makes London the most linguistically diverse country in the world? We created a wall of 'welcome' words in many different languages.

Horowitz class have continued to have a busy time in school with their learning, and also many have been involved in clubs, Young Voices rehearsals and sports matches.

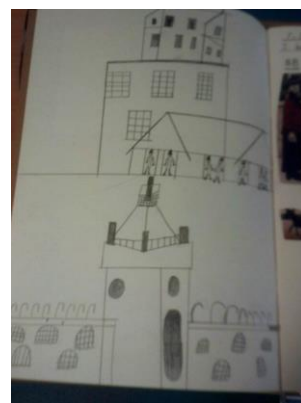
We began our new art unit last week which focuses on the work of LS Lowry. The children have been analysing his work and looking at what various pieces have in common. We discussed colour, tone, theme and medium. Following on from the analysis, they focussed on the people in Lowry's work and experimented replicating them with various grades of pencils.

In RE, the class have been building on from what they learnt on their trip earlier this term and have been exploring how Muslims worship and the importance of commitment and peace in Islam. They have been looking at translated parts of the Qur'an and exploring the meaning of words to gain a deeper understanding of how Muslims are guided by their holy text. There have been many excellent responses to this work and parallels drawn by the children with other religions and also how they are guided and supported in their lives.
